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| 13 treasures | 5.4 | Bedeveled by evil fairies that only she can see, thirteen-year-old Tanya is sent to stay with her cold and distant grandmother at Elvesden Manor, where she and the caretaker's son solve a disturbing mystery that leads them to the discovery that Tanya's life is in danger. |
| A Coyote solstice tale | 3.2 | After a little girl, who is dressed like a reindeer, crashes Coyote's solstice party, she brings them to a mall where Coyote has fun shopping--until he realizes he needs to pay for everything. |
| A paddling of ducks : animals in groups from A to Z | 1.4 | An illustrated, alphabetically arranged introduction to collective nouns pertaining to groups of animals, from an army of ants to a labor of moles and a herd of zebras. |
| A taste of colored water | 3.5 | Young cousins Lulu and Jelly, inspired by stories told by a classmate, hitch a ride into the city hoping to take a gulp of what they imagine must be some pretty special water that comes from the "colored" drinking fountain. |
| Alchemy and Meggy Swann | 5.9 | Includes bibliographical references (p. 167). Meggy Swann, a girl who walks with the aid of two sticks, arrives in Elizabethan London, along with her goose Louise, to stay with her father who really does not want her, and while he pursues his dream of transforming base metal into gold, Meggy undergoes a transformation herself. |
| An orange for Frankie | 4.2 | Frankie and his eight brothers and sisters learn lessons about giving, family, and tradition during a snowy Michigan Christmas long ago. |
| Bag in the wind | 3.2 | One cold, spring morning, an ordinary grocery bag begins blowing around a landfill, then as it travels down a road, through a stream, and into a town, it is used in various ways by different people, many of whom do not even notice it. |
| Blue Goose | 1.5 | When Farmer Gray goes away for the day, Blue Goose, Red Hen, Yellow Chick, and White Duck get together and paint their black and white farm |
| Child of the civil rights movement | 2.8 | Includes bibliographical references. Paula Young Shelton shares her memories of the civil rights movement and her involvement in the historic march from Selma to Montgomery. |
| Christmas tapestry | 4.4 | A tapestry that is being used to cover a hole in a church wall at Christmas brings together an elderly couple who were separated during World War II. |
| Colors of Australia | 5.5 | Uses colors to focus on the history, physical features, and culture of Australia. |
| Dodsworth in New York | 2.4 | When Dodsworth sets out for adventure, including a stop in New York City before going to Paris, London, and beyond, he does not expect a crazy duck to stow away in his suitcase and lead him on a merry chase. |
| Dodsworth in Paris | 2.7 | When Dodsworth and the duck vacation in Paris, they have a grand time despite running out of money and accidentally riding their bicycles in the Tour de France. |
| Emma Kate | 2 | Emma Kate and her best friend share many activities, such as homework and soccer practice, and even have their tonsils out at the same time--all the things best friends do, but there is more to this best friend than meets the eye. |

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| Every autumn comes the bear | 3.4 | Every autumn a bear shows up behind the farm, and goes through a series of routines before finding a den among the hilltop boulders where he sleeps all winter long. |
| For the love of Autumn | 3.6 | Miss Parks, a new teacher, is devastated when her cat, Autumn, disappears during a storm, but with the help of her students, she finds not only Autumn but also the man of her dreams. |
| Ginger and Petunia | 4.7 | When her beloved Ginger, a piano-playing socialite and very snappy dresser, makes a last-minute trip to London not knowing her housesitter has cancelled, Petunia the pig does more than fend for herself, she becomes Ginger. |
| Hana in the time of the tulips | 4.4 | A little girl seeks to regain her father's attention during the tulipomania craze in seventeenth-century Holland. |
| Horace and Morris join the chorus (but what about Dolores?) | 2.9 | Dolores is upset when her friends are chosen to sing in the chorus, but she finds a way to become part of the performance. |
| Horace and Morris say cheese (which makes Dolores sneeze!) I know here | 2.1 | The timing could not be worse for Dolores the mouse when she develops a food allergy to yummy cheese right before the Everything Cheese festival. |
| | 2.3 | Map on endpapers. A little girl who lives in a trailer in Saskatchewan while her father works on building a dam, is upset by the news that the project is nearly done and her family will be moving to Toronto, but her teacher suggests a way she can take all her memories with her. |
| January's sparrow | 4.4 | After a fellow slave is beaten to death, Sadie and her family flee the plantation, traveling north through the Underground Railroad in search of freedom. |
| Junk Yard Wonders | 4.5 | Inspired by a teacher who believes each of them is a genius, a class of special-needs students invents something that could convince the whole school they are justifiably proud to be "Junkyard Wonders." |
| Keeper | 4.7 | Ten-year-old Keeper heads to a sandbar in a small boat along with her dog BD and a seagull named Captain in order to find her mother, a mermaid who left her when Keeper was only three. |
| LMNO Peas | 3.7 | Busy little peas introduce their favorite occupations, from astronaut to zoologist. |
| Luba and the wren | 3.9 | In this variation on the story of "The Fisherman and His Wife," a young Ukrainian girl must repeatedly return to the wren she has rescued to relay her parents' increasingly greedy demands. |
| My name is Sangoel | 2.3 | Sangoel, who is proud of his rich African heritage, moves to America, and when nobody there can pronounce his name correctly, he fears he will lose his identity. |
| My name is Yoon | 2.1 | Disliking her name as written in English, Korean-born Yoon, or "shining wisdom," refers to herself as "cat," "bird," and "cupcake," as a way to feel more comfortable in her new school and new country. |
| New Zealand ABCs : a book about the people and places of New Zealand | 4.6 | Includes bibliographical references (p. 32) and index. An alphabetical exploration of the people, geography, animals, plants, history, and culture of New Zealand. |

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| Oh, Look! | 2.1 | Three goats visit a fair but run home after they seem to encounter a troll. |
| Possum and wattle : my big book of Australian words | K-3 | Illustrations and text introduce and define more than one hundred Australian words for young readers, covering animals, plants, and landscapes. |
| Princess Bess gets dressed | 3.8 | A fashionably dressed princess reveals her favorite clothes at the end of a busy day. |
| Princess Grace | 3.8 | Grace wants to participate in her community festival's princess float, but first she must decide what sort of a princess she wants to be--from an African princess in kente cloth robes to a floaty pink fairy tale princess. |
| Princess party | 2.2 | Little girls dress up and use their imaginations while dancing at a ball, defending a castle in their backyard, and planning an extravagant tea party. |
| Sit-in : how four friends stood up by sitting down | 2.9 | Includes bibliographical references. A picture book that celebrates the fiftieth anniversary of the Greensboro, North Carolina, sit-in at the lunch counter at Woolworth's as a protest against segregation. |
| Someone for Mr. Sussman | 2.3 | Although she is the best matchmaker in the neighborhood, Jerome's Bubbie has a hard time finding a match for the fussy Mr. Sussman. |
| Something about Hensley's | 3.9 | Hensley's, a neighborhood general store, always seems to have what Molly, Kate, and their mother need. |
| Spot the plot : a riddle book of book riddles | 2.5 | An illustrated collection of thirteen poems, each of which poses a riddle about a familiar story. |
| Stories from the Billabong | 4.4 | Collects ten illustrated stories that retell the legends of the Yorta-Yorta, an ancient Aboriginal tribe from Australia, and includes "How the Kangaroo Got Her Pouch," "The Mountain Rose," and others. |
| The Barefoot book of Earth tales | 2.3 | Includes bibliographical references (p. 96).;The Sun Mother (Australia) -- Why the sky is far away (Nigeria) -- She who is alone (American Southwest) -- Grumpy gecko (Bali) -- The magic garden (Kazakhstan) - - Amrita's tree (India) -- Stink water (Wales). Seven folktales from around the world express the belief that the Earth and all living things are sacred, and that it us up to each of us to care for our part of the planet. Includes an introduction and "eco-activity" for each tale. |
| The lion & the mouse | | In this wordless retelling of an Aesop fable, an adventuresome mouse proves that even small creatures are capable of great deeds when he rescues the King of the Jungle. 2010 Caldecott Medal Winner |
| The pink refrigerator | 3.7 | Dodsworth does as little work as he can, collecting items from a junkyard and placing them in his thrift store for sale, until he happens upon a pink refrigerator that spurs him to do much more with his life. |
| The rock and the river | 3.9 | In 1968 Chicago, fourteen-year-old Sam Childs is caught in a conflict between his father's nonviolent approach to seeking civil rights for African-Americans and his older brother, who has joined the Black Panther Party. |

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| The sandwich swap | 3.3 | Best friends Lily and Salma disagree over their preferred foods, but after trading sandwiches to see how they taste, the girls change their minds. |
| Uluru, Australia's Aboriginal heart | 6 | Includes index. Describes Uluru, formerly known as Ayers Rock, in Australia's Uluru-Kata Tjuta National Park, its plant and animal life, and the country's Aboriginal people for whom the site is sacred. |
| Waking up down under | 2.7 | Illustrations and simple rhyming text describe how twelve different animals in Australia wake up, including the kookaburra, kangaroo, echidna, koala, and emu. |
| We planted a tree | 2.3 | Simple text reveals the benefits of planting a single tree, both to those who see it grow and to the world as a whole. |
| Who will plant a tree? | 2.6 | Describes how a number of animals, such as squirrels, black bears, geese, and dolphins, unknowingly plant trees. |
| Whose food is this? : a look at what animals eat-leaves, bugs, and nuts | 2.6 | Includes bibliographical references (p. 23) and index. Presents a children's book that examines the kinds of food that animals eat such as nuts for squirrels, ants for an anteater, nectar from a flower for a hummingbird, and bamboo for a giant panda. |
| Woods runner | 5.1 | From his 1776 Pennsylvania homestead, thirteen-year-old Samuel, who is a highly-skilled woodsman, sets out toward New York City to rescue his parents from the band of British soldiers and Native Americans who kidnapped them after slaughtering most of their community. Includes historical notes. |
